- 3 Novel and adaptive thinking:** Thinking and coming up with creative solutions
- 4 Cross-cultural competency:** Operating in different cultural settings
- 5 Computational thinking:** Translating vast amounts of data into abstract concepts and understanding data-based reasoning

Accommodation at Melbourne

- There is a range of options available to you including:
 - University owned or partnered accommodation
 - colleges
 - home stay
 - private rental
 - student accommodation providers such as Student Village Melbourne
- The University provides an offer of guaranteed accommodation to full-time equivalent students. Semester 1, 2021 accommodation applications are **now open**.
- If you are looking for alternative options, useful search terms may include student apartments, hostels, share houses, homestay and temporary accommodation. You can also speak to the Student Housing team for support.

Application deadlines

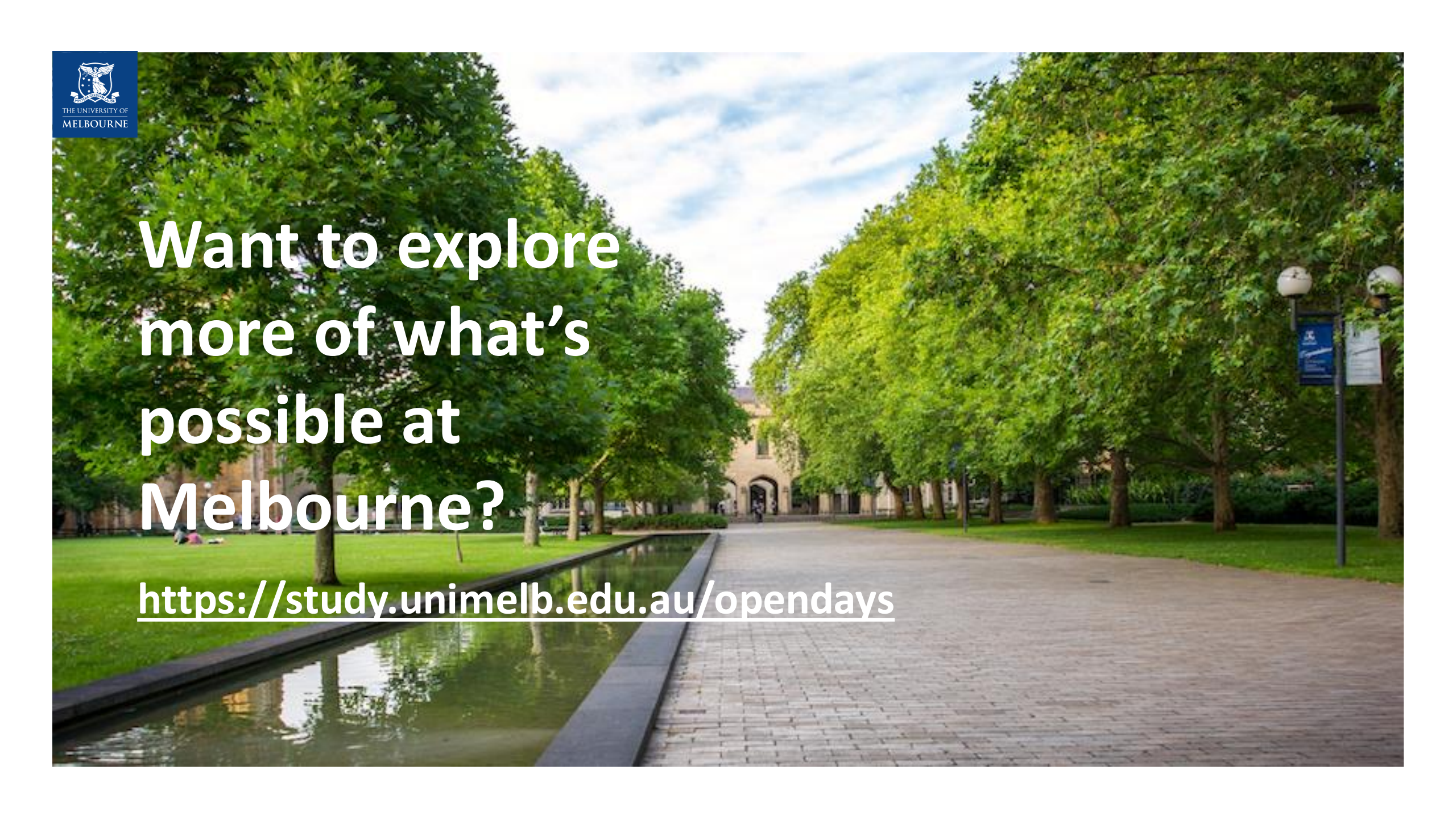
SEMESTER 1 (FEB/ MARCH) - 30 October the year before

SEMESTER 2 (JULY/ AUGUST) - 30 May the same year

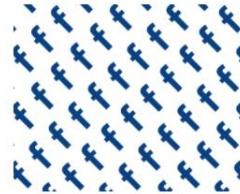

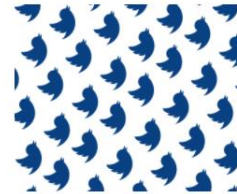

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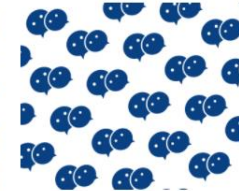
