Frequently highly ranked in international comparisons of national performance





PHD STUDIES

PhD / Doctoral Programmes

- Usually completed within 3-4 years
- PhDs in NZ are research only
- Three application rounds per year (students must apply before 1 March, 1 July or 1 November)

Why PhD in NZ?

- International PhD students only pay domestic fees
- PhD students usually get full-time work rights, partner gets open work visa and children get enrolled as domestic students in NZ state schools

Why PhD at Victoria University of Wellington?

- Easy online application system
- No need to identify supervisor (supervisor will be matched with applicant)
- Expression of Research Interest for initial application (full research proposal is written with supervisor in first year)
- Scholarship opportunity (up to NZ\$23,500 per annum stipend plus domestic tuition fees for up to three years)



STUDY ABROAD

- Available at undergraduate and postgraduate level
- Students can either select individual courses or select from a predesigned Specialised Study Abroad package.
- Study Abroad Packages:
 - Business
 - Society and Ethics
 - Biotechnology and Biodiversity
 - Climate, Environment and Biodiscovery
 - Data Science
 - Software and Computing
 - New Zealand and the Pacific Islands
 - Education
 - Creative Arts and Communication
 - Language, Culture and Identity
 - Global Studies
 - Health Studies
- Students usually nominate 6-8 subjects and they eventually study 3-4
- Study time is usually 6 months or 1 year (1 to 2 trimesters)

Points vs. Credits

The value of courses is usually 15 points (3.75 US credits/7.5 ECTS) or 20 points (5 US credits/10 ECTS) – based on recommendations from Victoria University of Wellington



PATHWAYS

English Proficiency Programme (EPP)

- Three intakes per year March, July, November
- 12-week programme
- Leads to most undergraduate, postgraduate and PhD programmes

Foundation Studies

- Taught exclusively at UP Education in Wellington
- 6-18-month programmes
- IELTS 4.5 to 6.0
- Guaranteed pathway to undergraduate degree
- Scholarship opportunity for high achievers

Graduate/Postgraduate Diplomas

Graduate and postgraduate diplomas can be a pathway into Master degrees (ie. students want to continue in a field different from their undergraduate major).

Credit Transfer and Exemptions

- If students already have a tertiary-level qualification, or part of one, they can apply for academic credit transfer or exemptions from required courses at the University.
- This might provide students with advanced standing or reduced workload for their study at the University

STUDENT SERVICES AND SUPPORT (a selection)

Arrival Arrangements

Free airport pick-up – every international student is met at Wellington airport by a current student and taken to their accommodation

Health / Wellbeing / Counselling

- Medical centre and pharmacy
- Wellbeing awareness teams and wellbeing workshops
- Counsellors available to discuss personal and academic issues

Recreation

- Recreation centres cater to students' fitness, wellbeing, recreation, and sporting needs.
- Staff available for high-performing athletes who require additional assistance

Visa / Insurance

Visa renewal service (first student visa needs to be done by student or agent) + insurance claim service

Course Advice

Advice on course selection, degrees, career options, academic structures, etc.

Career Development

Connecting students with employers and the community and preparing them for future employment - guidance for job applications, CV's, interview techniques, career Expos

Academic Support + Academic Monitoring

Workshops or one-to-one appointments to enhance writing, reading, research, maths, and general study skills + the international office monitors students' academic progression

Libraries / Language Support

- Library facilities on all campuses services include research consultations, tours, classes, online subject guides, and tutorials
- Wide range of resources to help students learn their chosen language (Language Learning Centre)

Interest, Conflict and Dispute Resolution

Advice, assistance and guidance around students' safety, studies and interests

Disability Services

Tailored assistance (disability or impairment, mental illness, injury, medical condition or specific learning disability that affects learning, participation or enjoyment at university)

Student Finance

Assistance with paying fees, budgeting and scholarship applications

Accommodation Service

Services around halls of residence, homestays and finding flats

Over 130+ Student Clubs & Societies

Clubs based on faculties, sports, cultures, nationalities, languages and abilities (music, arts, etc.)

Student Exchange

Exchange programme available with the over 100 university partners worldwide.

Inclusion, Diversity and Sustainability

- Commitment to diversity and inclusion through appointed staff to provide services to students from various backgrounds, minorities and religions
- Ambitious plan to become carbon neutral in a not so distant future and to provide services and resources on a sustainable foundation.

Wellington International Leadership Programme

- Focuses on global competency, advances critical thinking and leadership challenges in world affairs
- Tailored version for short-term students Students receive a certificate and letter of completion

Wellington Plus Programme

- Community volunteering which develops leadership skills & social responsibility
- Tailored version for short-term students Students receive a certificate and letter of completion



ACCOMMODATION & LIVING EXPENSES

Accommodation

Halls of Residence

- 9 catered + 5 self-catered halls
- Can cater for almost all dietary requirements
- Alcohol free floors and female only floors (selected halls only)
- Walking distance from campus and the city

Homestay

Students who wish to live in a family environment in New Zealand can stay with a homestay family.

U18 students can choose between homestay and selected halls.

Living Expenses (estimated expenses for one academic year)

- For visa purposes, Immigration New Zealand requires NZ\$15,000
- Realistic for a university student for 40 weeks is NZ\$17,000-20,000 (depending on lifestyle)



SCHOLARSHIPS

Tongarewa Scholarship

NZ\$5,000 or 10,000 for wide range of programmes (holistic consideration with focus on merit)

Wellington International Excellence Scholarship

Up to NZ\$20,000 over three years of study – students must have studied at least one full year at a NZ high school (merit-based)

Study Abroad Scholarship

Up to NZ\$1,000 for Study Abroad Students (holistic consideration)

Featured master's programmes

Automatic fees waiver (specific amount) for selected master's programmes when students meet course entry requirements

VISA & WORK RIGHTS

Working in NZ

The authorising agency for student work rights and post study work visa is Immigration New Zealand.

Student Work Rights

Usually 20 hours per week and full-time during scheduled holidays.

Post Study Work Visa

Completing an undergraduate degree or a postgraduate degree at Victoria University of Wellington paths the way for students to apply for a Post Study Work Visa (3 years) in NZ.

Minimum Wage

Anyone 16 or over who is in employment in NZ must be paid the minimum wage.

Employment Rights

NZ has a comprehensive set of employment laws that help keep workplaces fair.

NZ Dollar – NZ is a largely cashless society

THINGS TO KNOW ABOUT WELLINGTON (WLG)

City Landscape

WLG is surrounded by a large harbour to the east and the ocean to the south as well as hills to the west and north of the city.

Main Industries and Employers

One of WLG's main employers is the government sector with ministries, government departments and embassies being located in the city. WLG also has a large hospitality and services sector and a thriving arts/design/film industry.

Culture and Nightlife

WLG has a vibrant culture, arts scene and nightlife – mostly concentrated in the city centre

Festivals
